WAC Captain Speaks Here

Captain Emma M. Baird and First Lt. Janet M. Ellis of the Women's Army Corp Procurement Office, Third Army Headquarters, Atlanta, Ga., will speak to all young ladies at the Appalachian State Teachers College to promote an interest in the commissioned status of the Women's Army Corps.

The subject will be directed at how to obtain a direct commission, and how the summer training program will benefit the college student. Also the explanation of the shortage of military personnel in specialized fields, and how you can replace this shortage by holding a commission in the Corps will be discussed. Many of the questions that puzzle college students will be answered by the officers.

Captain Baird was commissioned April 3, 1943. She holds a B. S. Degree from Loyola University and a MA in Sociology from the University of Virginia. Captain Baird's medals and decorations include the Army Commendation Ribbon, World War II Victory Ribbon, Army Theatre Ribbon, WAAC Ribbon, National Defense Ribbon, and the Reserve Officers Ribbon.

First Lt. Ellis entered service February 14, 1952. She was commissioned March 14, 1953. She holds degrees in Home Economics from Deans College, Franklin, Mass. She has been awarded the National Defense Medal.

NEW TYPE EYE-BANK

New York—Medical researchers recently announced that sight-giving "windows" for human eyes can be dried and preserved for two years to help some blinded persons. The corneas donated by persons who just died are dehydrated in glycerine, then kept in vacuum-sealed tubes at room temperature. Thin layers of these corneas have been grafted successfully into the eyes of persons whose own corneas were clouded or injured.
