### Wine Festival Time



In the wine producing countries of the world, this season of the year brings a wine festival—a time for community celebration. This year, many U. S. cities are having wine festivals of their own, so that more and more Americans may take part in these post-harvest celebrations. At home or abroad, fruit and cheese served with a glass of your favorite wine make distinctive refreshments most any time of year.  
Easy to prepare, this "Wine Cheese Spread" is a flavorful blend of several cheeses, seasonings and California Port. Turned out of a ring mold and surrounded with colorful apple wedges and a variety of breads and crackers, it makes a snack tray that speaks gracious hospitality.  
Keep this tangy cheese spread on hand. Try adding crisp chopped raw vegetables such as celery, carrots, green pepper or cauliflower; to the savory cheese mixture for variety. For greatest enjoyment pair it off with glass of California wine, Rosé or dry Sherry for an appetizer, or with a sweet Sherry for dessert or late-evening snack.

**Wine Cheese Spread**  
1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese  
1/2 cup California Port wine  
1/2 pound sharp American cheese (2 cups)  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 ounces Roquefort or blue cheese  
Dash cayenne pepper  
Soften cream cheese, and gradually blend in Port wine. Grate American cheese and blend with remaining ingredients, mixing well. Pack into small ring mold (about 6-inches in diameter) and chill thoroughly. Dip mold in hot water, and invert over serving plate to remove from mold. Makes 1 (6-inch) ring.

### Duke Alumni To Enjoy Banquet

The Allegheny, Ashe, Avery, Watauga Duke Alumni Association will meet at the Daniel Boone Hotel, Boone, Saturday, November 2, at 6:30. A banquet meal will be served. All alumni of Duke University and Trinity College and friends are invited to attend, announced Rev. E. H. Lowman, local president. It will be desirable for reservations to be made for the meal through Mr. Lowman.

Dr. Frank T. deVyver, head of the department of economics at Duke and director of undergraduate studies, will represent the alumni office. Dr. deVyver, a native of Mount Vernon, New York, with scholastic training at Oberlin and Princeton, came to Duke in 1935. He is the author of several books and articles on labor and industrial matters. He is a member of American Economic Association, Southern Economic Association, Industrial Relations Research Association, O. D. K., and Phi Beta Kappa.

Dr. deVyver has an outstanding reputation as a student of industrial conditions and has spent considerable time visiting industrial plants through the South. He recently returned from Australia, where he received a Fulbright Grant to lecture.

### CONSTRUCTION

The construction industry will score dollar volume records of about \$47.5 billion this year and \$49 billion next year, it is predicted. Other private construction is expected to hold its own while public construction will continue to boom, with the only weakness being in military building.

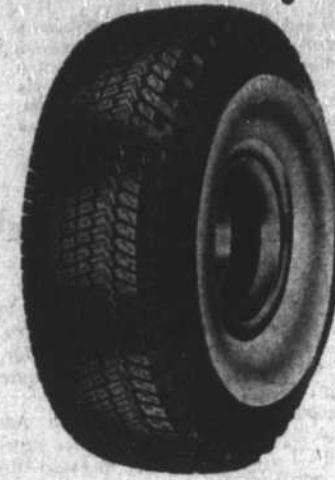
