Wine Festival Time

Wine Cheese Spread 1 (8-ounce) package cream

cheese cup California Port wine pound sharp American cheese

Dash cayenne pepper

Soften cream cheese, and gradually blend in Port wine. Grate
American cheese and blend with remaining ingredients, mixing well
Pack into small ring mold (about 6-inches in diameter) and chill
thoroughly. Dip mold in hot water, and invert over serving plate
to remove from mold. Makes 1 (6-inch) ring.
