# \$150,000 Park Area Vote Will Be Held On July 15

### Clubhouse, Pool Among Proposals

A municipal election has been called by Mayor Gordon H. Winkler and the board of aldermen to permit the citizens of Boone to vote on the issuance of \$150,000 in bonds for the purpose of building a recreation center on the Horn in the West property, now owned by the town.

A tentative date of July 15, 1958, has been set for the election, contingent upon compliance with election laws and approval of bond attorneys.

It has been estimated that a tax increase of approximately 15c on the \$100 property valuation will funds to finance the bonds.

The project would provide for a community club house and swimming pool, playground, teen canteen, and concession stand, all to be located on the large lot on the outside corner of the property immediately south of Oak Street. Long-range plans call for deve
