

### Flower Show

An exhibitor may make but one entry in a class in the horticulture division except where classes are sub-divided as to variety and color.

Flowers for cultural exhibits must be grown by exhibitor. All plants must have been in the possession of exhibitor for three months.

Flowers for cultural specimens should be labeled botanically.

Ribbons may be awarded in all classes: blue for first; red for second; yellow for third, white for honorable mention.

An award of merit, formerly called "Tri-Color," will be given to the best bloom or pot plant judged as the finest in the horticultural section. The grade must reach 85 or above for a bloom to be eligible for the award of merit. Standard judging will be used and ribbons will be awarded in all classes if merited. Judges will refer to their handbook for scale of points given by various plant societies.

Sweepstakes awards will be given the winners of the greatest number of blue ribbons.

Registration: Potted plants: Aug. 7, 3:30-4:30 p. m. All other exhibits: Aug. 8, 7:30-11:00 a. m. Exhibits registered after 11 a. m. will be non-competitive. Exhibits should be removed by 9 p. m. Aug. 8.

Containers entered at owner's risk.

Standard judging will be used and ribbons will be awarded in all classes if merited.

### Soil Conservation Operation Is Defined

Administration, Vocational Agriculture, and Soil Conservation Service.

Soil Conservation Service has been designated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as the technical agency to assist district supervisors in making soil and water conservation plans, and applying land use measures needed and desired by farmers in the area. A Memorandum of Understanding is necessary between the Soil Conservation District and the U. S. Department of Agriculture before Soil Conservation Service personnel are assigned to work in the district. Since Soil Conservation Districts are operated as a sub-division of State government, they are not controlled by any federal organization; but are only responsible to the people of the district, who elect them as their representatives.

The supervisors operate under the laws of the State of North Carolina to plan and carry out the soil and water conservation program in their district. These supervisors plan their program of good land use and rely upon the assistance of all agencies that are dealing with soil and water conservation to assist them in carrying out their program. These agencies include Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation, Extension Service, Farmers Home

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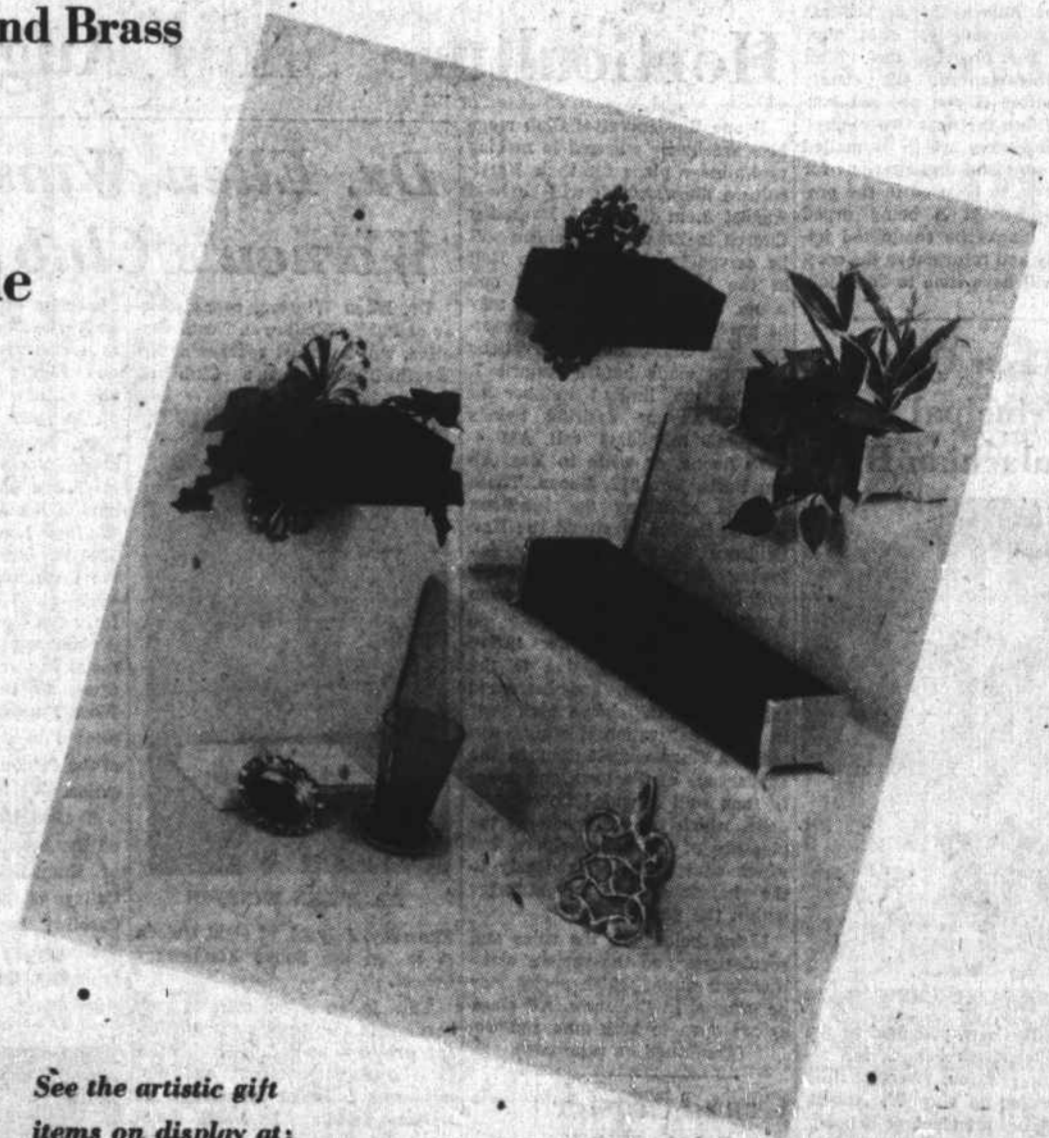
