Forty-Eight Calves Sold At Hereford Show, Sale

Forty-eight calves were sold in the 16th annual Watauga Hereford Breeders Association Purebred Show and Sale in Boone Saturday for \$8,797.50, an average of \$183.28 per head. Twelve bull calves brought \$2,765.00 for an average of \$230.41 per head. Thirty-six heifers brought \$6,032.50 for an average of \$167.57 per head.

The show was one of the "best attended" in years, according to B. W. Stallings, president of the sponsoring association, with an estimated crowd of 500 attending. They came to the show, which started at 10 a. m., and stayed through the sale that lasted on up into mid-afternoon.

The champion bull, Plato Paladin 58, was shown by Mr. and Mrs. H. Grady Farthing of Trailway Farms, Boone. Allen Jenkins of Mountain City, Tenn., bought him for \$380.00.

The reserve champion bull, CH Royal Triumphant, shown by Council Henson of Vilas, was sold to Lyle B. Cook of Boone for \$335.00. Both bulls were calved in November of last year.

John Dugger, Vilas, showed Miss Royal Larry for the champion cow. She sold for \$245.00 to John Winkler of Sugar Grove.

The reserve champion cow, CH Lady Princess, shown by Mr. Henson, was sold to R. C. Greene of Blowing Rock for \$180.00. Miss Royal Larry calved in September 1957, and CH Lady Princess in March of this year.

Largest purchasers were Boyd Huffman of Hickory, who purchased nine head for \$1,397.50, and Austin Leatherman of Newton, who purchased eight head for \$1,412.50.

Judges for the show were Bill Fisher of Cedar Bluff, Va., and D. W. Lynch, Tazewell, Va. Harry M. Hamilton, Jr., of Boone, auctioned the purebred Herefords and L. E. Tuckwiller, Watauga county agent, served as sales manager.

Several prominent cattle association figures were present for the show and sale. They included Bill Miller of the American Hereford Association; Paul Aycock of the American Polled Hereford Association; and Johnny Winston of the N. C. Hereford Breeders Association.

Also present were H. D. Quesenberry of the N. C. Department of Agriculture, and Bob Beard, editor of Farmers Federation News.

Mr. Stallings, in expressing his pleasure at the big turnout to the event, said the local Hereford breeders association felt "honored that these leaders in national and state organizations were present."

Other officers of the Watauga association are Robert Shipley, vice president, and Mr. Henson, secretary-treasurer.
