The Governor's Traffic Safety Council held its fifth annual meet ing in Raleigh Friday "to take stock of where we stand," according to Motor Vehicles Commission

Some 40 persons, including four representatives from Watauga county, attended the session in the Highway Building Auditorium.

Sheriff E. M. Hodges, Blowing Rock Chief of Police Lewis Hodge, Traffic Safetyman Don Mc-Cracken of the college, and Mayor R. B. Hardin of Blowing Rock took part in the council.

Mr. Scheidt, who presided, talked informally about legislation he will recommend for improved traffic safety. Some of the recommendations include an increase in the number of highway patrolmen chemical tests to determine intoxi cation of motorists and periodic inspection of motor vehicles.


