Two range fires in Watauga and Ashe counties burned over 325 acres last Thursday, at almost the same time. The first fire was reported to forest rangers at about noon, and originated in Ashe county on John Sutherland's place and spread to Watauga county in the Tamarack section.

325 Acres

The second fire which burned on Howard's Knob, started about 1:30 p. m. and burned over 75 acres before being brought under control six hours later at 7:30 o'clock. Both fires, according to Watauga county's Forest Ranger Crayte P., Teague, were result of fires set

to burn rubbish or briars. Damage caused by the fire at Tamarack was placed by the ranger at \$315, based on the rate of \$2.00 per acre to "open" land and \$3.50 per acre to timber land. This does not include damage to fence lines which were in the area, Mr. Teague said. Cost of fighting the fire was placed at about \$30.00, with 12 fire fighters being employed for five hours to get the flames under control. Several vol-
