

to enforcement of pedestrian laws throughout Troop E of the Highway Patrol, according to Charles W. Mason, of the local patrol. Watauga county is in Troop E. Mr. Mason points out that this

action is being taken to eliminate some of the accidents in which pedestrians might be killed or injured. According to patrol records, 229 pedestrians were killed and 1.835 injured in North Carolina during the year 1958.

Many of these acidents could have been avoided if pedestrians had observed laws governing pedestrians, or if motorists had been observing laws made for protection of pedestrians, Mr. Mason said. punishment provided for non-compliance:

Section 22 of the General Ordinances of the North Carolina State Highway Commission provides that it shall be unlawful for pedestrians to walk along highways except on the left side (facing traffic) thereof. A violation of this section is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100.00 or not more than 60 days in fail or both.


