Italian Cooks Rated Tops

No one would dispute the fact that Italians really know how to eat. Good Italian food is somewhat harder to come by than good French or English dishes—but those of us who have had the pleasure, count fine Italian cooking as tops.
Next to fresh fruits, the favorite Italian dessert is cheese. Most often, it is presented on a tray and in large cities the array usually includes Dutch gouda, Swiss Gruyere and English cheddar.
Italians are fond of cooked desserts made from cheese. Two favorites are ricotta pudding and ricotta fritters.
Ricotta cheese is a fresh, moist cheese—an unsalted version of our own cottage cheese usually made with cow's milk or sheep's milk. Extremely creamy, this cheese is often sprinkled with sugar and eaten just so as a dessert.
Another interesting food we are hearing more about (and eating more often) is fresh Sardines.
Until recently, we must admit, that we thought that the Sardine grew in the can.
Fresh Sardines are quite delicious and are available in several large cities in the U. S.

These cookies are rich gems of sweet, fresh-tasting walnuts and convenient morsels of semi-sweet chocolate mixed into a light brown sugar meringue set atop a rolled oats base.
Walnuts for cracking come in sparkling one and two-pound cellophane bags. Or try the handy shelled California walnuts in either the recipe-size saran bags or vacuum cans. Just empty the semi-sweet chocolate morsels from the bag right into the meringue. What could be easier.
California Walnut Chocolate Meringue Strips
1/2 cup butter
1 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg, separated
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/4 cup quick cooking rolled oats
1 8-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate morsels (1 cup)
1/4 cup California walnuts, coarsely chopped (3-ounce saran bag)
Cream butter. Gradually add 1/2 cup of brown sugar; cream until light. Mix in vanilla, egg yolk, flour and rolled oats. Spread in a buttered 8-inch square baking pan. Beat egg white until stiff; gradually beat in remaining 1/2 cup brown sugar until stiff peaks form. Mix in semi-sweet chocolate morsels and half of walnuts. Spread over oatmeal mixture and sprinkle with remaining walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees 35 to 40 minutes or until meringue is golden brown. Let cool in pan. Cut in strips. Makes about 2 dozen strips.
