160,000 TAKE PART IN WORK **Census Takers To Start Nose Count On Friday**

The 1960 Census of Population and Housing, the Nation's 18th decennial nose count, gets underway on Friday morning, April 1, with 160,000 census takers starting their rounds which will take them to every dwelling unit in the United States. In covering the 31/2 million square miles of land area of the 50 States, the census takers will travel an estimated combined distance of more than 1,000 times around the world, or approximately 28 million miles. District Supervisor Mr. Roby D.

Pennell pointed out that residents of this area can speed up the big count by having their advance report forms filled out and ready for the census takers. This action will save time for both the house holder and the census taker, the census official said.


