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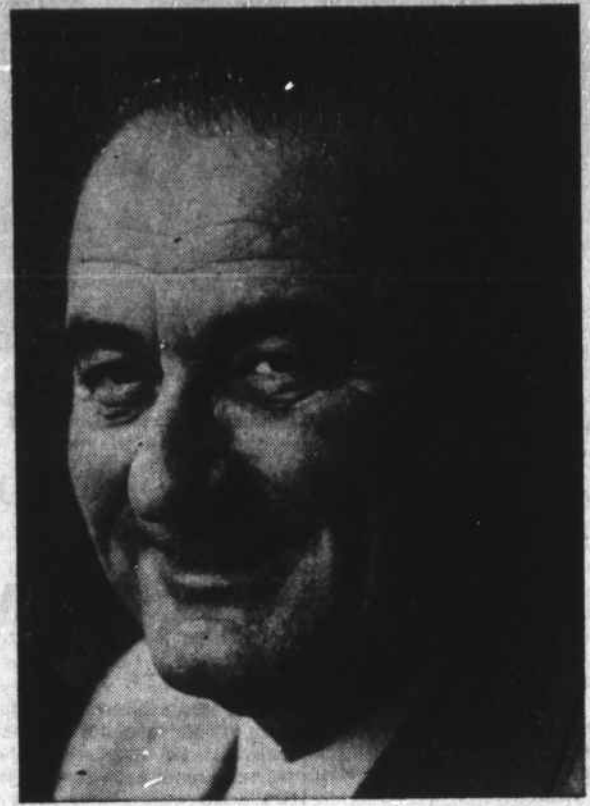

Big States Tilt Edge To Demos

Sen. Jack Kennedy amassed a comfortable electoral vote lead over Vice-President Nixon in Tuesday's voting, and squeaked through with a popular majority of perhaps less than a million in the hardest fought national election in recent times.

Nixon amassed a popular vote lead in the early returns which was quickly dissipated as returns began to come in from the big states of the east, but the race tightened in the early Wednesday morning hours as Nixon appeared to have taken western states with the exception of California, which provided the winning margin for the Massachusetts lawmaker.

Democrats, G. O. P. Split Watauga Slate

Watauga county voters went to the polls Tuesday in record numbers to give the Democrats and Republicans practically an even division of county offices, with the control of the Board of Commissioners going to the Democrats, unofficial returns from the county's sixteen precincts indicate.

Gordon H. Winkler was defeated in the county for the State Senate by 4277 to 4423 for J. W. Norris, Republican.

Representative Jack Edmisten, Democrat, was defeated by Republican Murray Coffey for the House, 4308 to 4471.

Miss Helen Underdown, Democratic Register of Deeds, won reelection handily over Ruby Greer Norris 4786 to 4056.

For County Commissioners the voters chose Ivan Dishman and Gene L. Reese, Democrats, and S. Bynum Greene, Republican, to give the Democrats control.

The vote for commissioners follows:

Democrats: W. C. Lentz 4355, Ivan Dishman 4366, Gene L. Reese 4425.

Republicans: S. Bynum Greene 4422, William C. Byers 4201 and Ralph Hayes 4310.

Roby Vines, Democrat was elected County Surveyor without opposition.

Sanford Is Winner; Kennedy Takes N. C.

Terry Sanford won the race for the Governorship of North Carolina in Tuesday's balloting by a majority of some 110,000 votes, on the basis of incomplete returns from over the State.

The Democratic candidate, about whose head a storm broke as a result of his voting for Senator Kennedy in the Los Angeles convention, led from the outset over his Republican opponent, Robert Gavin, in the hardest fought State race in decades.

At the same time the Sanford sweep carried the State also for Kennedy by about 64,000 votes.

Senator Everett Jordan, on the basis of incomplete returns was leading Kyle Hayes for the U. S. Senate by 114,000. The rest of the State Democratic ticket was safe.

Congressman Charles Raper Jones, the only Republican in the North Carolina delegation in Congress, won easily over David Clark in the tenth district. All other House races appeared in the bag for the Democrats.

In the ninth district Congressman Hugh Alexander appeared to be elected. Radio reports early Wednesday estimated his lead over W. S. Bogle at near ten thousand votes.

Lackey Named Chairman Alumni "Heartline" Program At College

E. G. "Red" Lackey of Winston-Salem, past Alumni Association president and trustee of Appalachian State Teachers College, has been named chairman of "Heartline," the college's new alumni annual giving program.

"We feel that no better man could be found to handle this important leadership role," Bob Allen, director of ASTC's foundations, said.

Instead of dues, an annual giving campaign, called "Heartline," will be conducted each year, providing each ASTC alumnus the opportunity to contribute in accordance with his or her wishes. But membership in the organization will not depend upon whether or not a financial contribution is made.

Funds received from ASTC's "Heartline" will be used to operate the alumni association and go toward purchasing suitable land, off campus, upon which an Alumni House may be built in the not-too-distant future.

Lackey's past experience as president of the alumni association certainly qualifies him for the "Heartline" chairmanship, Mr. Allen said. During Lackey's reign as president, twelve active alumni chapters were organized in the Tar Heel counties of Ashe, Buncombe, Cleveland, Forsyth, Gaston, McDowell, Mecklenburg, Moore, Randolph, Stanley Surry and Watauga. Florida organized a chapter, as has a group near Tokyo, Japan, Allen said.

In addition, a headquarters office for the Alumni Association has been established in the campus Administration Building, complete with modern mailing equipment, photo studio and adequate files.

Lackey is a native of Alexander county, and received his primary and secondary schooling there. He is the son of the late E. E. and Mrs. Jane Sharp Lackey. He was graduated from Appalachian in 1937, and was an all around athlete, being a charter member of the Monogram Club.

After graduation Lackey was a successful high school football coach for four years in Taylors-

Week End Brings Snow To Boone, Environs

Boone and area had the first snow fall of the season over the week end. Some snow was visible late Saturday and early Sunday morning, but the main fall began in mid-afternoon Sunday.

According to records kept by the United States Weather Bureau observer, approximately an inch fell on the station here. Other sections of the county had heavier fall and some reports came in of more than two inches. Cars traveling from outlying sections of the county into Boone with snow on their tops seemed to bear these reports out.

The snow Saturday followed a

rain Saturday, which dampened the spirits and bodies of football fans at the Appalachian-Guilford game. The temperature for the twenty-four hour period ending at p. m. ranged from 29 degrees to 47, with the thermometer standing at 31 at reading time. Saturday night the temperature dropped to 25 degrees and was not able to get higher than 35 by 6 p. m. Monday.

Monday night, with much of the snow still showing, the temperature reached a low of 14, but by 6 p. m. Tuesday had climbed to 47.
