## Recommended At ASTC Line By Line

Raleigh - The State Board of Higher Education has recommend ed that a new type budget formula, designed to allow flexibility in spending operations, be used at Appalachian State Teachers College during the next biennium.

**Budgeting To** 

Be Eliminated

The board announced that the new budget formula eliminates the need for line-by-line budgeting of money as in the past. The appropriations in the "A" budget for the school are based on the expected student enrollment during the two-year period and the cost per student per quarter hour of instruction.

The board said the formula will enable: (1) economy, (2) efficiency in operation, (3) simplicity in computation, (4) equity among the institutions when, and if, the budget formula is extended to the other state-supported schools, and (5) "objectivity in analysis of fi-

The board recommended total The "A" budget continues services at the present level.

Meanwhile, the board announce it had recommended "B" budge spending totaling \$4,499,656 during the next biennium at the 12 state-supported schools.

The "B" budget requests include new programs or increased spend-ing. The biggest item is \$2,835,766 (Continued on page six)
