### Garden Time

Time was when there were no snapdragon varieties suitable for outside production. Now, thanks to the plant breeders and All-American trial gardens, we have varieties with extra large flowers and spikes which rival the best winter varieties produced in greenhouses.

The Rocket Snapdragons—Red Rocket, Orchid, Golden, White, Rose and Bronze Rocket—are the first and only mid-summer heat-resistant varieties of hybrid snaps. Another variety you may wish to try is Vanguard. This variety, also a hybrid, is a rich rose pink with yellow throat.

If we were asked to select two of the most satisfactory cut flowers I expect most of us would name the snapdragon and the gladiolus because they last so long after cutting. Now that there new hybrid varieties are available, you should arrange to have some in your garden next summer. Check with your garden supply center.

In All-America tests at Raleigh in 1960, these varieties performed real well. I believe they will also do well east of Raleigh and especially well in the upper Piedmont and Mountains.

There are several other exciting new 1961 All-America selections you should try: "Rosie O'Day," a rose-colored alyssum; "Gloriosa Double Daisy," a golden yellow, much more desirable than Black Eyed Susan and just as easy to grow; and "Coral Satin," a beautiful satin pink petunia.

Try these three in a border planting. Use the daisy for a 3 foot background. Next, the rich salmon coral petunias for 12 to 15 inch mounded plants. Then edge the border with alyssum which grows only 2 to 3 inches high but spreads (each plant) 8 to 12 inches.

If this combination has no appeal for you, I am sure that you can work out a better one. In any event, you should use all of them if you want to be first in the parade of All-America selections for 1961.

**CANCER FIGHT URGED**  
An international fellowship program to aid in the fight against cancer has been established.

The project is backed by a grant of \$250,000 from the Eleanor Roosevelt Cancer Foundation. It is designed to provide opportunities for study in this country by promising cancer researchers from foreign nations, and for similar study abroad by United States researchers.

### FARM CENSUS NOTE

**FARM CENSUS.** Each farm owner shall prepare a list of the acreage of each crop grown, including tenths of acres of truck. The list should show the total acres cultivated by the owner, also the acres cultivated by all tenants on each separately recognized farm, the acres in improved pasture, woodland, idle and other lands. He shall be prepared to report the number of bearing fruit trees, the numbers of livestock of breeding age, number of hogs sold or slaughtered during past 12 months, and number of chicken. This information is kept confidential and has no relation to taxes. Its purpose is for agricultural education, economic analysis and safer guidance of county agents and farmers generally.
