## Methodists To Lend Africa Aid

Richmond, Va.—A nation-wide call to Methodists to make a "sacrificial response" in an April 30 offering to help Africa with food, healing and leadership training has been issued by Bishop Paul N. Garber for the Richmond area.

The bishop said churches of the Richmond area would participate in the offering, the largest single appeal ever undertaken by The Methodist Church. The goal is \$2,500,000.

Bishop Garber's letter to the churches pointed out: "If there is any section of the world of which thinking people everywhere are necessarily conscious today, it is Africa. What happens there must affect largely the whole world."

"Christian missions have been at work in Africa for long years. What they have been able to accomplish is one of the most thrilling stories of missionary achievement to be found on the pages of history. But present events make it clear that we must now gird ourselves for new and larger ministries to this troubled but promising continent. The church must move in now with new training programs, for the Congo in particular finds itself in possession of new freedom with almost no trained leadership.

"No emergency that we have brought to the attention of the church has been more serious or more worthy of sacrificial response."

that everything he has comes from God.  
2. He must admit that he has made a mess of what God has given him and marred God's creation.  
3. In spite of his own unworthiness, God has given him eternal life.  
4. In gratitude to God for this gift he must work, pray and give for the spread of his kingdom.  
The meeting was attended by men, women, young people and children of the deanery. The Rev. Robert Campbell of Hickory presided over the meeting. A picnic supper was served at the close of the meeting.
