Remember cutting down on liquids causes a certain loss of water—not fat. In fact many doctors advise an increased amount of liquids during a reducing diet.

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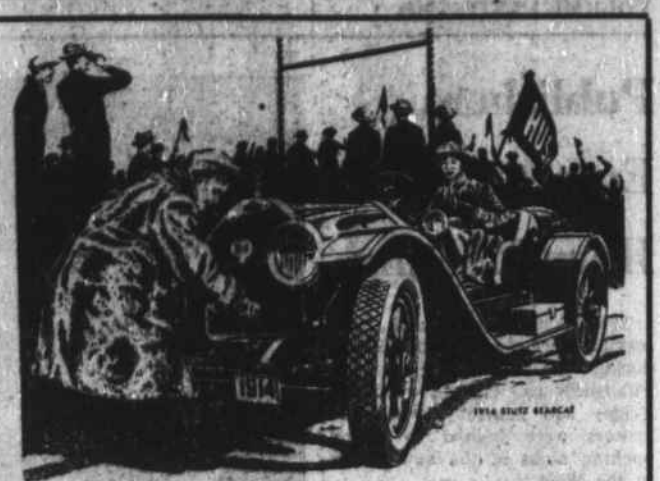
