Dr. Robert Gregory of Wake Forest College, who has traveled widely in Africa, will speak July 6 at 3 p. m. in the Administration Building Auditorium.
Dr. Felix Garcia will talk in the

Fine Arts Building Auditorium on July 13 at 8 p. m. A Cuban international lawyer and economist, Dr. Garcia has been in political exile from Cuba since May 6 of this year. He resides in Miami.

He has served with the foreign office in Bonn (Soviet Affairs Desk) and has been consulate general in Antwerp, Belgium.
