Doctor Talk

By JOHN B. REMBERT, M. D.

Tetanus, or "lockjaw," is a horrible disease with a very high mortality rate which yearly proves fatal to hundreds of Americans needlessly. The disease is caused by a bacillus called clostridium tetani, which upon entering the body, grows upon tissues that are dead or have been damaged. Once established in the body, the bacillus produces a powerful toxin or "poison" affecting the nervous system of man—a toxin against which man is peculiarly helpless. How this poison acts is not definitely known; but it seems that once in the body, it is probably taken up by the peripheral nerve endings and then travels in the nerve sheaths to the spinal cord and brain.

After the toxin reaches the spinal cord and brain, the characteristic picture of the disease appears—that is, stiffening and aching of the neck muscles, jaw, and face, and then difficulty in opening the mouth and swallowing. The muscle rigidity of the neck and face gradually spreads, involving the entire body; and finally generalized muscle spasms resembling convulsions are superimposed upon the rigidity.

To prevent this horrible malady from occurring, it must be stressed that it is the responsibility of all adults to be sure that they and their children receive active immunization against tetanus. As is so often the case, parents will see to it that their children are properly immunized against tetanus, but fail to protect themselves.

All Americans should take advantage of the immunity afforded by the tetanus toxoid; but especially all farmers, laborers, and those who ride in or drive an automobile—in short, all will benefit by active immunization. Each day injuries occur to individuals who have failed to receive booster shots of tetanus toxoid in many years; and every year hundreds die due to this negligence. The surest and safest protection against the disease is to receive active immunization with the tetanus toxoid, and once the initial immunization of three injections is completed, then booster doses should be received at least every five years. Individuals, such as farmers, in especially exposed occupations, or individuals with a history of allergy to biological products, such as tet-

anus antitoxin, should receive a booster dose at least every year.

All readers of this column have heard the statement that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," and this is especially true in the case of tetanus or "lockjaw"—since there is no cure! Contact your family physician now and make arrangements for active immunization against tetanus, and don't forget your booster dose at prescribed intervals.

MOON SHOT DUE IN '62
The United States will try to hit the Moon early next year with an unmanned spaceship called Ranger.

Space agency officials who revealed the plans said the Ranger—10 feet tall and 750 pounds—will carry television equipment to transmit pictures of the moon's surface back to the earth.

A seismograph will be included and its purpose will be to make studies of the moon's structure.

Misconceptions About Food Given

Grandma's remedy for "spring fever"—sulfur and molasses—brings to mind many of today's misconceptions about foods. While facts about food buying and selection may not seem exciting as the "good old remedies," false information can waste your money and may affect your health.

Mrs. Ruby Uzzie, consumer marketing specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service, would like to know how you would answer the following questions. Would you answer them yes or no?

Can you tell when your plants get sick?

"Most plants get sick at some time during their lives," says Dr. W. C. White, Extension agronomy specialist at North Carolina State College. "But if you read the symptoms, you may be able to 'doctor' them effectively."

The most widespread illness of plants, says White, is nutritional disorder. This means—in a nutshell—that they're not getting the right kind or amount of food.

"Farmers feed their plants fertilizer and lime; but often they don't give them what they need," White says.

Growing plants often display symptoms that tell what's wrong with their diets. "Specific symp-

oms sometimes are hard to identify; but some point to definite troubles," says White.

When there isn't enough nitrogen, the plant leaves turn yellow. A V-shaped area yellows in the midrib of corn leaf.

Potassium deficiency on alfalfa produces yellowish spots on the leaves. On corn, the leaf margin turns brown.

"There are many causes for plant illness," says White, "whether it's corn, tobacco, azaleas, grass or roses."

One major cause is the nematode, which destroys plant roots. The result is a stunted plant that may die.

Another is the fungus, a pathological disease which damages plant tissue and roots.

"Drought, insects, too much rain and a wide variety of other things make plants sick and frequently, die," says White. "But in many cases the illness can be prevented or cured."

Each year, Tar Heels spend millions of dollars to prevent or correct plant diseases. "They could save a lot of money and grow better plants if they would let people who know plants well diagnose their troubles," says White.
