# Know The Weather

Yes, there is scientific basis for cooking by the weather. Experienced chefs know that there are certain cakes and icings which cannot be satisfactorily made in rainy weather.

Cakes fall and icings turn out too grainy. Certain candies, like pralines, do not become creamy. This is due to the great amount of moisture in the air, which is picked up by the ingredients.

Because moisture has such a great effect on certain kitchen products many recipes are varied—are slightly different in the dry western states from those recommended in the other states, proof that the weather has a considerable effect on cooking.

Three of these men stopped and paid as agreed. The third one also stopped, and with his head bowed, and tears almost falling from his eyes, said in a quivering voice, "Mrs. Greene, I hate to disappoint you about paying for the gas: My church didn't take an offering for me. I will pay you some day if the good Lord will."

I happen to know this was one of our most devoted preachers in the county at that time. He was working hard, that he might show himself approved unto God a workman that need not be ashamed. (We were almost over the depression at this time.)

Recently I attended the Three Forks Baptist Association and heard some wonderful reports on what the Baptists are doing for the Children's Home, Home and care for the aging, Christian education, hospital, home, state and foreign missions, and the further away from home the longer the report. I support all of these.

Why neglect those so close by, next door neighbors, friends, visitors, and etc.?

Not many months ago a native returned home after a few years' absence. On Sunday he attended church services. I happened to be in these services. Some few days later I happened to meet this man. I said to him, Bill, if you are coming back to your old stomping

ground to live, why don't you straighten up some things with the good Lord, dedicate your life to him, join the church and be an asset to your community?

His answer: If I was fit to join the church I would not join there. They don't want me. You remember the Sunday you were there, only one person shook hands with me, three others spoke to me and one invited me back.

I think most of the delegates, and I was one from my church, to this association know that many hundred tourists visit this section each summer. Some spend a few days, others a few weeks, others a few months. Many are buying summer homes. There was not one word said, or a suggestion made regarding invitations to these travelers to worship with us, or the reception to give those who by chance happened to drop in the service.

But they did discuss about asking the engineer on Tweetsie not to blow his whistle.

There are lots of hungry souls traveling, and any one of us would rush quickly to assist one who is physically handicapped, but we pay little attention to those round about us who are spiritually handicapped.

We hear a lot these days about conquering outer space. I contend there is an inner space within each of us which should be conquered and filled with the love of God. Then we would be better prepared to examine things far away.

# About Your Home

We are told that men are taking more interest in home furnishings than ever before. This is said to account for many of the new trends in furniture and fabrics used in decorating the home. Seems the men demand more service and less fancy trim. The new functional type furniture that has several different uses is a perfect example of what men like to find in household and office furniture.

Some sound advice from a male decorator is to keep two things in mind if you are thinking of buying furniture: "Buy good merchandise and plan on what to buy with the money that is available." If the money you have allotted for furnishing will not completely furnish your house, buy just the necessary pieces of good quality furniture and wait until you can afford the other pieces. In the long run you will be better satisfied with what you have. You won't be faced with the problem of replacing new pieces or repairing what you have already.

The two popular woods on the market today are birch and walnut. Wrought iron furniture is being replaced by the woods, although the trend is still in the contemporary style.

The section of the country you are living in has great bearing on the kind of furniture you choose. For example, in south Florida and California, modern and rattan is used extensively; in the deep southern states the traditional is still the favorite, the New England states favor the colonial type. Early American, so popular a few years back in all sections of the country, seems to have fallen from favor. The fine old pieces will always be considered top choice by people who appreciate fine furniture. It was the over-doing copies that caused Early American furniture to bite the dust.

Another bit of important advice—never go in for fad type furniture. This rule applies to your choice of personal adornment as well as clothes. However, because furniture usually represents a larger investment of dollars, it is more important to keep this in mind. Always ask yourself how a certain piece of furniture will look ten years from the time you are buying it.
