He proved his point when he said, "This beautiful 17 county area of yours from Watauga to Cherokee, which embraces a half million people with income of more than \$61 million, is served by 142 motor carriers."

Wilson also outlined safety activities conducted by the Motor Carriers Association including the annual State Truck Roadshow, the "Driver of the Year" program, "Share the Road" campaign, and the N. C. Driver Training School founded by the association at N. C. State College some 12 years ago.

"Still surging forward, still increasing its power to serve, the trucking industry stands today as the gateway to a brighter future for all North Carolinians," he concluded.

## Plans Are Given For 1963 Summer Session At ASTC

Plans are already beginning to take shape for the 1963 summer session. The first term of the 1963 summer session will begin on June 6 and close on July 12. Two-week terms within the first six-week term will be from June 17 to June 29 and from July 1 to July 12. The second six-week term will begin on July 15 and close with the annual summer commencement exercises on August 16. Two-week terms within the second six-week term will be from July 15 to July 26 and from July 29 to August 9.

The faculty for the summer session of 1963 will be made up of a strong nucleus of regular faculty members from the college. It will be supplemented by visiting faculty members from other colleges and universities and educational agencies from North Carolina and other states. It is hoped that some of the visiting faculty members on the campus this summer will be able to return to the campus during the summer of 1963.

The courses to be offered during the 1963 summer session will implement the purposes of Appalachian's summer session. These purposes are to provide opportunities for our regular undergraduate students to accelerate their college careers by attending college year round, to provide opportunities for recent high school graduates to begin their college study earlier, to provide opportunities for undergraduate students from other colleges and universities to take courses here during the summer and transfer the credit back to their home institutions, and to provide a comprehensive graduate program for teachers and other educational workers.

We will continue our traditional offering and provide graduate curricula leading to the Master of Arts degree with majors in elementary education, the various subjects taught in high school, school administration, guidance and counseling, audio-visual services, supervision, junior college teaching, library science, and reading.

We will continue our efforts to offer some instruction in the newer media of instruction, including programmed instruction and television teaching. We also hope to make some effort in the area of special education.

We expect a combined total of registrations for the 1963 summer session to reach nearly 5,000 (there were nearly 4,500 registrations during the 1962 summer session) and it is expected that our dormitories will be full. According to the present construction schedule, there will not be an additional dormitory on the campus until the summer session of 1964. It is expected that the student body of the 1963 summer session will be drawn from nearly fifty states and foreign countries.

Definite plans have been made for an ideal climate and beautiful scenery for the 1963 summer session.
