

# Mountaineers Host Panthers Saturday

The Appalachian Mountaineers entertain the league-leading Panthers of High Point here on Saturday night in the conference headliner. Action will begin in the Health and Physical Education Building at 8:00. Although a near capacity crowd is expected, officials do not expect a repeat of last week's game with Lenoir Rhyne when over a hundred people were turned away because of crowded conditions.

High Point has one of the finest teams to appear in Boone this season. New coach Tom Quinn took over a squad which finished second in the conference tournament last spring, added a new offense and several outstanding freshmen, and currently has one of the hottest teams in the state.

The Panthers are led by Phil Garrison, 6-3 junior who was voted the outstanding player in the conference last season. Garrison has the movements of a

guard but can work in the pivot and rebound with the best of the big men. Height is no problem with Bill Fallin (6-7) and Dave Neel (6-9 in the front court.

Appalachian's coach Bob Light will counter the High Point attack with a couple of stars of his own. Wayne Duncan at forward and Jack Lytton at guard have developed into two of the league's finest. Duncan is among the leaders in scoring with a 20-point game average and is a top rebounder. Lytton currently is scoring at a 13.0 average per game, and is considered one of the finest outside shooters in the area.

Monday night the Mountaineers host the Pfeiffer Falcons. Beaten by the Light Brigade in their first meeting of the year at Pfeiffer, revenge will be the word for the Pfeiffer team. Pfeiffer is coached by an Appalachian graduate, Francis Essic.

Coach Robert Light, the Mountaineer coach, started his second unit and played them the first ten minutes of the game. They played a slowed-down type of game. Appalachian guards Wall and Lytton led the attack for the Mountaineers. Wall hit for 15 points and played a fine floor game. Lytton also hit for 15 points, hitting 7 out of 10 from the floor. Jim Richardson scored 12 and Wayne Duncan added 10 points to aide in the Mountaineer cause.

Dewey Andrews was high man for the Christians with 19 points followed by Jesse Branson with 15. The Mountaineers' next home game is this coming Saturday night against the league leading Purple Panthers for High Point College.

# LR Bears Rout Apps; Wells Paces Attack

The Lenoir Rhyne Bears walloped the Appalachian Mountaineers by the score of 68-49 before a capacity crowd of 2,000 and saw 100 people turned away from the game. This loss was the first for the Mountaineers in Carolinas Conference action and the third loss for the Mountaineers this season. They have won 7 and lost 3 on their overall record.

The game was a nip and tuck affair for the entire first half with the Bears of Lenoir Rhyne taking the lead at 20-19 with 4:00 minutes remaining in the first half and they were never behind again in the entire ball game. Due to a cold shooting streak by the Mountaineers in the second half the Bears were able to turn the game into a rout. Lenoir Rhyne outscored the Apps 47-24 in the second

half and were sparked by the fine play of center Jerry Wells in this spurt. The Bears led by as much as 25 points in the second half.

Top scorer for the game was the Bears Wells who tallied 22 points and he was followed in the Bears scoring by Ed Mistkowski with 16 and guard Neil McGeachy with 12 points. Appalachian was led by their star forward Wayne Duncan who scored 19 points in a losing cause. Veteran forward Jim Richardson of the Mountaineers was held to no points by the Bears Jim Wiles. These two boys played together while in high school at North Wilkes.

The next home game for the Appalachian Mountaineers will be this coming Saturday night against the Purple Panthers from High Point College.
