

College Symphony Orchestra To Appear In Concert This Evening

The Appalachian State Teachers College Symphony Orchestra will appear in a concert of light music on Thursday evening, April 4, at eight o'clock in the Fine Arts Auditorium. This is one of the first performances of this type scheduled for the orchestra, and the present program is designed for popular appeal.

The orchestra is in its fifteenth season, having been organized in 1948 by its present conductor, Dr. Nicholas Erneston.
