Devils Drop First One In Two Years To Bears

The Appalachian High School Blue Devils lost their first ball game since September 8, 1961, last Friday night at the hands of the Mt. Airy Granite Bears. Since that time, (Sept. 8, 1961) the Blue Devils had won 23 games and tied one while building up the longest winning streak in the school's history.

The teams played on an even basis throughout the first half with both defenses controlling the game. Mt. Airy was inside Appalachian's fifteen-yard line on three different occasions, but the Blue Devils' defense rose to the occasion each time and held the Bears without a score.

The second half was much like the first until midway through the third quarter, Chuck Blanton broke through Mt. Airy's line and outran the secondary as he scampered for a 55-yard touchdown. A running attempt for the extra point was stopped cold.

Appalachian's defense kept the Bears in check until late in the fourth quarter. After Mt. Airy received a punt on their own 45-yard line, two successive 15-yard penalties were called against the Blue Devils giving the Bears a first down on Appalachian's 25-yard line.

From there the Bears marched to the three-yard line where Mike Allran scored with only 2½ minutes remaining in the game. Jerry Chapman kicked the extra point to give the Bears the 7-6 victory, as the Blue Devils didn't have time to pull it out of the fire.

Mt. Airy is not in Appalachian's district so the Blue Devils

are still currently tied for first place in District 7 with a 3-0 record against conference foes. This week, the Blue Devils play the North Surry Greyhounds at home in a conference game. North Surry defeated Mt. Airy 6-0 earlier in the season, so this week's contest should be a real thriller.

Apps To Host Bears In Night Grid Tilt

The Lenoir Rhyne Bears will meet the Appalachian Mountaineers in William J. Conrad Stadium in Boone Saturday in the feature attraction of the Carolinas Conference. The game is a night contest and is expected to attract a capacity crowd to Appalachian's new 10,000-seat stadium.

The setting for the game has some of the luster removed because both teams came out of conference action last week on the losing side of the ledger. Appalachian lost to Elon, 18-13, Rhyne was disappointing in a Burlington while Lenoir Homecoming crowd in Hickory with a 27-14 loss to Newberry.

However, the annual contest between the two close rivals is always a highlight of the season, and usually provides the ball in western North Carolina. Last year the Mountaineers

largest crowd to witness football played a great defensive game against Lenoir Rhyne in Hickory, only to lose, 6-0, on a long touchdown "bomb" in the last two minutes of the contest.

The game this week will feature the vaunted Bear single-wing attack against a tough Mountaineer defensive line. Lenoir Rhyne has averaged 231 yards per contest thus far while Appalachian has allowed only 148.5. Tailback Craig Wardlaw is the chief threat in the Bear attack. He currently is averaging 104 yards rushing per game, while the Apps have allowed all opponent backs a rushing average of only 70.5 yards per game. Something must give when the opposing forces meet.

Saturday's game will be the 27th meeting of the two schools. The win by Lenoir Rhyne last

year moved the Bears ahead in the series with 12 wins to 11. Three games have ended in ties.
