Lenoir Man **WasEnRoute** To Deep Gap

Donald Edmund Watson, 37, of Lenoir, was dead on arrival at Watauga Hospital about 12:30 a.m. Sunday after a traffic accident on the Blue Ridge Parkway about five miles southeast of Boone.

Park Ranger Ernest Hayes said Watson's brother, Harold Dean Watson, 27, of Lenoir, Rt. 5, suffered multiple cuts. He is in Caldwell Memorial Hospital in Lenoir. His condition was reported as satisfactory Sunday night. Hayes said Harding Cox and

Bruce A. Clark, both of Lenoir, who were passengers in the car, escaped injury.

Hayes said he was told the car entered the Parkway at Green Hill Road and the four were en route to Deep Gap to visit friends. At Mile Post 287 the car struck an ice patch, overturned several times down an embankment into a creek. The men were trapped in the car and had to break a windshield to escape. Donald Edmund Watson was pinned beneath the car.


