# LOW BID \$17,207 **Daniel Boone Theatre** Will Be Fully Rebuilt

#### **State Funds** To Be Used On **Horn Facility**

Herman W. Wilcox, executive vice-president of the Southern Appalachian Historical Association, sponsors of the outdoor drama "Horn in the West," announced this week that the contract for the rebuilding of the Daniel Boone Theatre, site of the drama, has been awarded to the G. Perry Greene Construction Company.


The successful bid was for \$17,207. This bid covers the rebuilding of the walks, steps, curbing and aprons for the seats, and all electrical work in connection with aisle lights, including a complete aisle lighting system placed in conduit underground.

A new scene dock was previously constructed, not included in this bid, in the amount of \$1,259.98.

Additional work to be done is the repainting of all buildings up front, including the information office, ticket office, concession stand and rest rooms, as well as the rain shelters and equipment buildings and walls around the theatre. New chairs for the reserved

section will be purchased. The rest of the chairs are scheduled to be repainted.






#### **Farmer Of** Year Chosen
