Wataugans came out again en masse Sunday to receive the second and final does of the Sabine vaccine in an effort to stamp out the dread killer and crippler, polio. A total of 10,-145 went to the four polio immunization centers at schools in the county and took the lumps of sugar containing two drops of the new vaccine which makes them immune against all three strains of polio. According to Dr. Hadley M. Wilson, chairman of the Oral Polio Immunization Program for Watauga County, over 65% of the county's population has received the required two doses
