Mr. Esser was born in Norton, Virginia, but has spent his entire protessional career in North Carolina. He was assistant director of the Institute of Government in Cnapel Hill and University of North Carolina professor of public law and cycle of poverty through the North Carolina Fund.

Some of his accomplishments include: serving as advisor for studies in numerous North Carolina communities; author of dozens of articles which have been published in such magazines as Popular Government, The North Carolina Law Review, and others; co-author of two guidebooks having to do with tax policy in North Carolina; member of the North Carolina Bar, the American Society for Public Administration, the American Political Science Association, and other scholarly, professional, and civic organizations.

Mr. Esser is married to the former Mary Irene Parker of Beaufort, South Carolina, and they have three children. He is a member of the Episcopal Church and they live in Chapel Hill.

Approximately 451 undergraduates and 37 graduate candidates are expected to receive diplomas in the graduation exercises.
