Records To **Be Broken** At Appalachian

Dr. James Stone, director of summer sessions at ASTC, reports that 1730 students have registered for the first session. Sixty more registered Monday, June 15, for the NDEA Language Institute, and 150 more are expected to register for the first two-week workshops in art education, reading supervision and teaching supervision which begins classes June 22 and continues through July 3. Directors of these workshops will come from leading colleges and universities in the southeast.

According to Dr. Stone, this enrollment figure is more than five per cent increase over the last summer registration.

The first summer session officially opened June 9 and will continue through July 17 with a large number of outstanding visiting professors serving on the summer sessions faculty.

A high school camp is operating this summer on the campus of Lees-McRae College at Banner Elk. About 200 students have already enrolled in these classes.


