#### Commission Accredits Hospital

As a result of a recent survey of Watauga County Hospital by The Joint Commission of Accreditation of Hospitals, the hospital has been notified that it has been fully accredited for a period of three years. The Commission also stated "that the proposed construction of an entirely new 83-bed hospital is highly commendable."

The accrediting agency is made up of The American College of Physicians, American College of Surgeons, American Hospital Association, American Medical Association and Canadian Medical Association.

Dr. Russell H. Blood visited the hospital on May 21 to examine departments such as medical staff organization, medical record department, dietary and nursing department.

Dr. Blood stated that he was favorably impressed by the excellent medical program carried on at the hospital. Watauga Hospital was first approved in 1955 and has been fully approved since that time. Watauga County Hospital is also the only fully approved hospital in Watauga County.

It is pointed out that the survey by the Joint Commission is purely voluntary, and made only by hospitals that request




