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

**Ernie Triplett Faces Trial In Superior Court** BY RUTH H. MARICH


A true bill for murder was found by the Grand Jury Monday in the Watauga County Superior Court in the case of Ernest Triplett charged with the April fatal shootingof Roger Hicks. This case will come before the court in this week's session. Sheriff Dallas Cheek has summoned a special venire from which a jury will be chosen to try the case.




