#### **Measure** Passed **By** Committee **On Education**

Raleigh - The N. C. House Education Committee overrode the objections of the Watauga County representative and ign-ored a resolution from the bipartisan Watauga County Board of Education Wednesday. The committee junked Rep. James Holshouser's choice for

board membership, reduced the board's membership from five to three and gave the Democrats a monopoly on it. The reason: Holshouser is a

Republican, and Democrats run the Education Committee.

Holshouser appeared before the committee as it considered the omnibus bill under which the vast majority of county boards of education are appointed in the state.

The omnibus bill, as written, contained the names of three Watauga Democrats: Dr. Charles Davant, H. W. Mast Jr., and A. E. South,

Holshouser explained that since 1963 Watauga had operated with a bipartisan board composed of three Democrats and two Republicans.

He said he didn't object to a


