Easter Seal Notes

With the exception of the federal government, the Easter Seal Society nationwide is the largest employer of physical, occupational and speech therapists of any health agency in the country. Approximately 3,000 professionally trained workers serve more than 200,000 crippled children and adults annually.

Treatment of more than 41,000 children and adults with speech disorders is reported by the Easter Seal societies. But they comprise only a fraction of the persons in America who need treatment for serious speech defects.

Crippling last year prevented some 29-million Americans from leading what is termed a normal life, reports the Easter Seal Society. The figure represents about 15 out of every 100 of our population and, the advances of medical research and scientific findings, continues to grow at an alarming rate.

Strokes are third in frequency of causes of death in the United States, accounting for more than 200,000 deaths each year, the North Carolina Heart Association reports.

Tells About Finland
Wanda Alphin, Rt. 4, Kinston, recently returned from Finland where she lived and worked with farm families as part of the International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) program.

"I lived with seven different families in different parts of the country," she told Mrs. Marguerite Kennedy, home economics extension agent, Lenoir County. "Some families were urban, some rural. They had a wide range of incomes."

Among other things Miss Alphin learned to cook Finnish foods, enjoy sauna baths, and study in Finnish schools. She said, "Finnish cities are modern and farms are becoming more so, as families buy milking machines, tractors, and other equipment. A mobile store comes into the rural areas each week to supply families with items they do not produce on the farm," she adds.

Miss Alphin found the Finns a do-it-yourself people. "Their small farms are models of self-efficiency for the families they serve," she reports.

Space Needs

Laundry equipment takes up more space than a homemaker may imagine, Mrs. Rebecca Gaddy, home economics extension agent, Anson County, says. A washer and dryer usually takes 5 feet of space; the ironing area, including table, clothes basket, and garment hanger, 7 square feet.

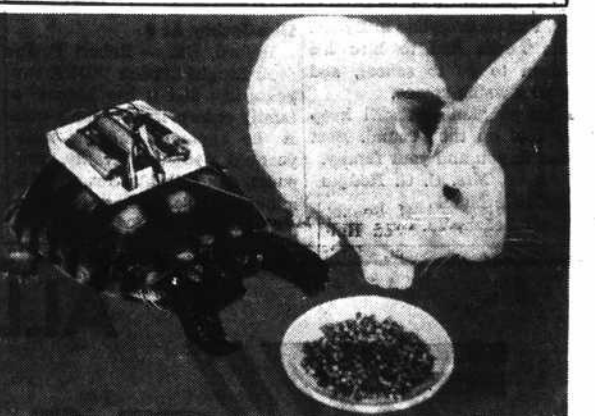
