"it is the little things that create differences, that in the big things of life we are as one."

Today many religions exist which are alike in certain ways and unlike in others. The Christian religion is distinctively different because of Jesus Christ. Mrs. Barden told of a number of changed lives because of the Christian religion which she has known in central Africa where she and Dr. Barden taught for a number of years. She also showed interesting curious from different parts of the world, particularly Africa, the Orient and Latin America. Some of the items were of special religious significance. A general discussion followed.
