Dear Rob: When persons make such an unwaranted assult upon your fine newspaper as was recently made, concerning your position on the food store boycott, I feel readers

who disagree should respond. Without going into the illogical arguments presented, it should be pointed out to persons who are interested in honest inquiory, that at the retail food level there is probably a lower mark-up than for any other major consumer item. As you know, personally, I am in no way connected with the food industry and I hold no brief for food stores. I also desire the lowest prices possible but the most likely result of a general food boycott would be to drive the small independent grocer out of business.

Persons who are really interested in the facts easily verify that food items in chain grocery stores are marked up only about 10%. After payment of the usual costs of operating the store this leaves less than 2% net profit on the sales dollar.

Perhaps there are ways the grocer can economize and reduce certain of his costs but to press for a reduction in the small margin of profit is finally doomed to an exercise in
