Writes In Behalf United Fund Effort

Dear Mr. Rivers:

The United Fund campaign is coming up again soon. For several years I've given a lot of time to building up the United Fund and it has not cost the organization a single penny. Why do I do this—because I believe the United Fund is the sensible way to support the organizations so essential to the welfare of Boone and Watauga County.

It provides a balanced approach to meeting all health and welfare needs—not just the spectacular and easily dramatized ones.

It eliminates duplication in agency services through (a) a centralized budget control and (b) it eliminates unnecessary organizations.

It enables agencies, relieved of time-consuming fund-raising responsibilities as a major activity, to devote more time to program and service.

It eliminates the annoyance and confusion of separate and oftentimes competing campaigns.

It reduces the cost of fund-raising by consolidating the costs of many appeals in a single operation.

It conserves manpower by concentrating volunteer participation in a single solicitation effort.

It provides a method for a fair distribution of funds, through annual budget review.

It represents the giving pattern most acceptable for the financing of local, state and national health and welfare programs.
