CERTAINTY ... The question as to how it is figured the next egislature will be Democratic—as stated here last deserves an answer.

There are 120 seats in the House; 50 in the State Senate. A lot of the Democrats nominated in the May Primary have Republican opponents this fall. There is a great deal of this letting the Democrats win by default in the eastern and southern parts of the State.
Add to these districts those

that have never gone Republican, you have an easy majority of the House in the Democratic column. From here, it looks like at least 75 certain Democratic votes.

A hurried look at the list of nominees shows only two Republicans—Jeter Haynes Yadkin and Claude Billings of Wilkes-without Democratic opposition.

Now over in State Senate Democratic situation is even more favorable. It looks as if about 15 of the 50 Democratic nominees have no opposition. Looking at it conservatively, there should be 35 Democrats in this body.

Again, only in one district-District 25 composed of Davie, Watauga, Wilkes, and Yadkin— are the Republicans without op-
