NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION COUNTY OF WATAUGA NORTH CAROLINA

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held in the County of Watauga, North Carolina, on November 4, 1969, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said County the question whether they shall approve or disapprove, (1) the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of bonds of said County of the maximum principal amount of \$1,400,000, and (2) the levy of a tax for the payment of such bonds, and (3) the bond order entitled "Bond Order authorizing the issuance of \$1,400,000 School Bonds of the County of Watauga" adopted by the Board of Commissioners on September 22, 1969, to authorize the issuance of said bonds and the levy of such tax. The bonds are authorized to finance the erection of several new buildings to be used as school houses, school garages, physical education and vocational education buildings, teacherages and lunchrooms, and other school plant facilities and to reconstruct and enlarge, by the erection of additions, several existing buildings located in said County and used for such purposes, and to acquire land and furnishings and equipment necessary for such new or reconstructed or enlarged buildings, in order to enable the County of Watauga, as an administrative agency of the public school system of the State of North Carolina to maintain public schools in said school administrative unit for the nine months' school term prescribed by law.

Any qualified voter of the County who expects to be absent from the County during all of said election day or who, because of sickness or other physical disability will be unable to be present at the polls to vote in person on said day may apply for an absentee ballot to be used in voting at said election not earlier than forty-five days prior to said election and not later than 6:00 o'clock P. M. on October 29, 1969.

IMPROVE COOKING SKILLS Johnston County homemakers, participating in the Expanded Nutrition program, are learning that cooking can be fun and exciting. One homemaker, Mrs. Bernice Cooper, told Mrs. Sylvia Brixhoff, assistant home economics Extension agent, "I've learned a lot."

For example, she said, I didn't know you could make cream from nonfat dry milk. I make it at least twice a week now and like to serve it on fruit cocktail.

The agent explained that non-fat dry milk can not be turned into cream, but does make a good whipped topping.

In addition, Mrs. Cooper showed Mrs. Brixhoff her canned products and elaborated on the meat loaf and yeast rolls program side Mrs. Tunie Whittington had taught her to make.

Funds for the Expanded Nutrition program are provided by the U. S. Department of Agriculture through the Federal Extension Service. Aides are assigned to counties with the approval of county commissioners.

The students of Watauga County are participating in a school drive the week of Oct. 13.

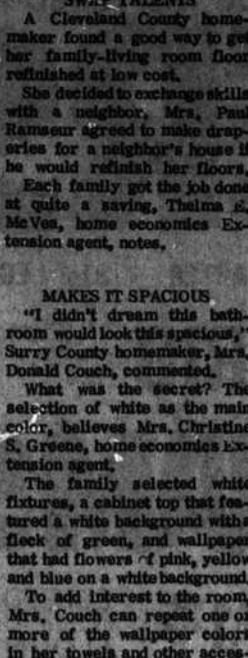
