### Planning To Be Married?

Future brides who plan to submit an engagement or wedding picture should plan ahead. Only black and white glossy will be used, since variations in color snapshots and portraits can result in disappointments at the last minute.

Wedding and engagement pictures along with story material should be in the newspaper office on the Friday preceding the date of the announcement or ceremony. Engagement pictures, which are run in a one-column size, are \$2 for processing. Wedding pictures may be this size or two columns wide, the latter being charged at \$4.

Wedding-engagement material need not be accompanied by a picture to be printed.

Wedding stories are printed in uniform size, each running no more than a single double-spaced typed page. There are no processing charges for fiftieth wedding anniversary pictures. All submitted pictures must be in sharp focus.

Engagement and wedding information must be submitted on Watauga Democrat forms, which are available in the office or by sending a stamped self-addressed envelope. Please specify whether the engagement or wedding form is wanted.

**DEADLINES**  
Although the Watauga Democrat carries a Thursday deadline, the press starts running Tuesday afternoon of each week.

Submitted material longer than a double-spaced typewritten page should be in the office before noon Monday of the week of publication. Shorter stories should be in hand by 5 Monday afternoon, Tuesday mornings are reserved for last-minute spot news and items. Classified ads can be phoned in until 11 a. m. Tuesday. After this time no additional material can be handled for the upcoming issue. Because of their involved composition, legal notices should be turned in by 3 Monday of the week of publication.
