

## Edentonians 50 Years Ago

Wm. James Leary, Jr.

This is another sketch in a series of write-ups about prominent Edenton people 50 years ago, taken from "Historical and Descriptive Review of the State of North Carolina," published in 1885:

William James Leary, Jr., one of those men of sense, who lend weight and standing to the community in which they are, was born January 2, 1854, in this county, five miles from Edenton. He was educated at Calvert College, Maryland, also at Lehigh University, Pennsylvania, returning to his native town where he faithfully applied himself to study law, with Captain Oct. Coke and later with Aug. M. Moore. Receiving his license in January, 1878, he commenced practice in partnership with his second preceptor with whom Elbert Riddick\_\_\_ he remained two years; he then removed to Hyde, but in twelve months returned to Edenton, where he has ever since enjoyed a large portion of the business at this point.

Mr. Leary gives his undivided attention to his clients' interests and has become recognized as an advocate of ability and a lawyer of learning. He married a daughter of Jas. Savage\_ James Woodard, of Edenton, by whom he has a family of two boys. He is a vestryman of the Episcopal Church, takes an active interest in public affairs, he has been town Intendent several times and personally is an intelligent, ready and entertaining conversationalist.
