At present the disease has invaded 54 counties in the State, a total of 274 cases having been reported to the State Board of Health up to Tuesday. United States Public Health Service workers have been sent into various parts of the State experimenting with a vaccine preventive.

In the meantime, health authorities urge parents to keep their children at home as much as possible, and to prevent them from mingling with other children, isolation being one of the best methods to prevent the spread of the disease.

Queer Disease Hits Hollowell Cotton

R. H. Hollowell, prominent Middle Township farmer, is worried about his 40 acres of cotton around Small's Cross Roads. Something has happened to his fine plants and he has quartets from Merry Hill, Colerain, appealed to Farm Agent N. K. Rowell to tell him what the trouble is. So far Mr. Rowell has been un-

able to make any explanation. Sample plants, about 18 inches high and mostly in bud, indicate that some sort of dry rot has hit the Hollowell acreage. The plants seem dried up, the leaves appear to have been riddled by some insect, and the stems have a rusty look.

Mr. Hollowell, an experienced cotton grower, knows all about "dry Must Be Inoculated rust" affecting cotton, but insists the eason has not advanced far enough Dog owners within the corporate limits of Edenton are reminded that dog licenses are now due and payable at the Collector's office.
