The Mobleys left Edenton, moving the equipment, which will most likely be taken to Norfolk, Va., to open a bakery there.

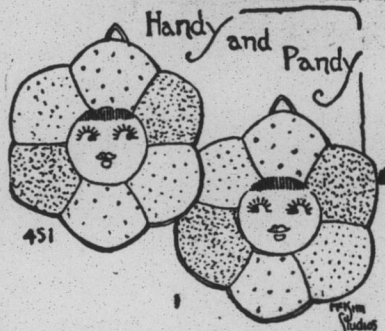

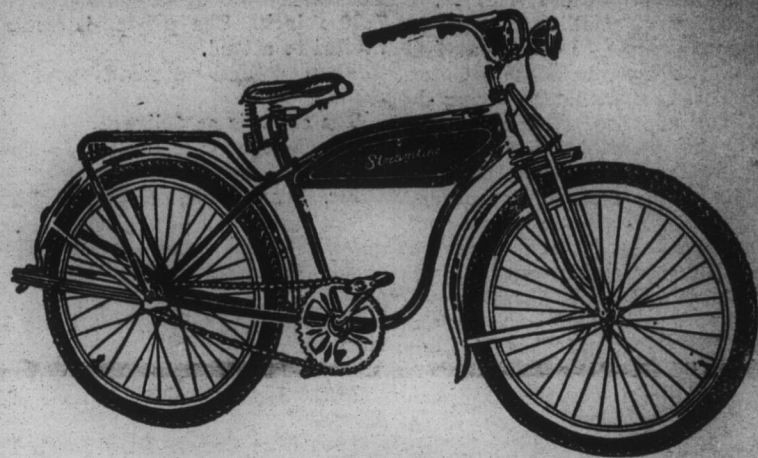

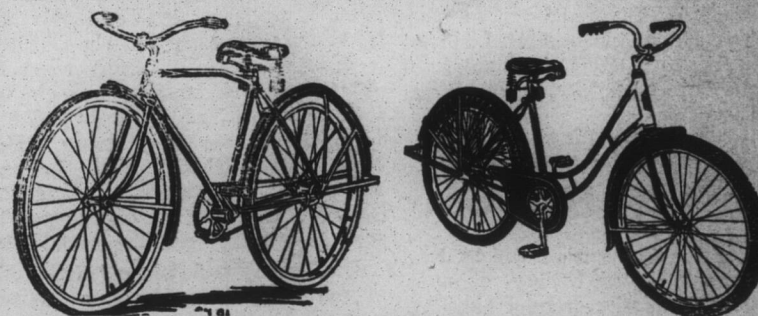
