**SONG OF THE CIRCUS**

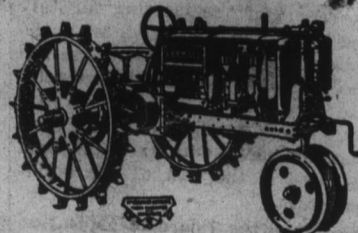
I like to see the elephants
