

Veteran Engineer Plans Next "Stop" In The Albemarle

Charles Bush Completes Enviably Record On P. R. R.

COMING HOME

Has Driven 3,000,000 Miles Without Having Major Accident

Friends in this section will be interested to know that one of its sons plans to return to native soil after completing an enviable record of 50 years service with the Pennsylvania Railroad, 45 years of which was in the capacity of engineer. Charles Bush, now 70 years old, left the county when only 19 years of age, going to Washington, D. C., to accept a job as brakeman on the Pennsylvania Railroad, and in a short time was advanced to an engineer.

Mr. Bush is a nephew of the late A. T. Bush, of Edenton, and was born and reared near Center Hill. He married Miss Nettie White, of Hertford. Just recently Mr. Bush was retired and he and his wife now plan to return to the Albemarle to spend the rest of their days on their farm at Durants Neck, in Perquimans County.

Pictured in the cab of his engine as he rolled into Washington on his last trip, The Washington Herald had this to say about the railroad veteran in a recent issue:

"As No. 155, the Constitutional, rolled into the Union Station at 7:30 o'clock last night, its pilot, Charles R. Bush, stepped out of the cab to be kissed by his wife and to say good-bye forever to railroading after 45 years at the throttle of Pennsy's fastest locomotive.

"The 70-year-old veteran, who has driven the line's crack steam and electric engine more than 3,000,000 miles between Washington and New York, was met at stops all along the route this afternoon by throngs of his old railroad friends.

"At Baltimore, C. J. Wilcox, road foreman of engines, joined him in the cab for the last lap of the journey.

"Too overcome to respond to the crowd which greeted him, Bush could only smile and glance at the big electric locomotive which he knew so well.

"As a boy of 19 Bush came to Washington from North Carolina to enter the employ of the Pennsylvania as a brakeman. In five years he was behind the throttle on the New York run. In 1900 he was the first man to run the line's crack Congressional Limited from Washington to New York in five hours flat.

"In all his long record of service he can boast that not one of his passengers was ever killed, and that he has never had a major accident.

"His next 'trip' will be to a little farm near where he was born, and where there is not a railroad within 15 miles."
