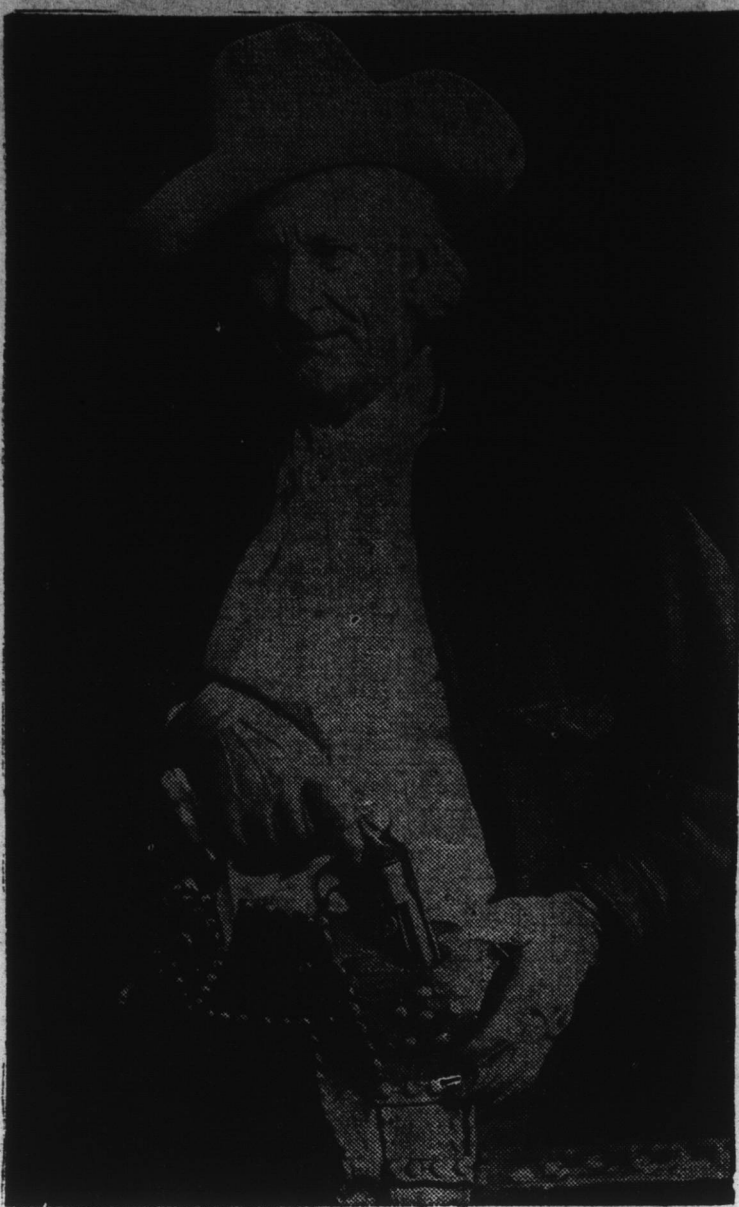

JESSE JAMES IN PERSON



Jesse James, who claims to be the original Missouri outlaw who was supposed to have been shot by Bob Ford on April 3, 1882, has returned to the realm of the living after a hide-out of fifty-one years, and will be seen in person at the Taylor Theatre in Edenton, Friday, Feb. 18.

Explaining that the historical "picture-on-the-wall" shooting was a frame-up, James says that he, his brother Frank and Bob Ford plotted to get rid of Charles Bigelow, an outlaw who had been committing crimes and leaving indications that it was the work of the James boys. When Ford shot Bigelow, Jesse immediately rushed into the room and changed guns and other marks of identification with the slain man, and escaped into the hiding that was destined to outdo Rip Van Winkle. During his seclusion, James earned a quiet living as a dealer in cattle and race-horses, spending most of the time in Colorado, and passing under the name of "Jim Williams."

When he decided to return to public life, Jesse James obtained assurances in Washington that charges once in effect against him were no longer in force because there were no living witnesses. Accompanied by a delegation of early settlers who had identified him, James also paid a visit to the governor of Missouri and was told that when the \$10,000 reward was paid to Bob Ford, the case was officially closed so far as the State of Missouri was concerned.

In his appearances at the Taylor Theatre, James will recount the highlights of his most interesting experiences and will describe his escape in detail. In addition to Jesse James in person, the Taylor Theatre will present Hank Farris and Ann Alexander, cowboy entertainers, in their famous Australian whip-cracking and fancy roping act. The screen attraction will be Betty Grable in "Thrill of a Lifetime."
