

Negro Farm Agent Pleased With Office

Paints Interior and Repairs Second-hand Furniture

J. B. Small, Negro farm agent for Chowan and Perquimans counties, in his monthly report to County Commissioners Monday was very appreciative for the cooperation of the Board in agreeing to pay the rent for a suitable place for an office where he can meet and discuss problems with farmers of his race. The agent's office is located in the building at the corner of Church and Oakum Streets, formerly used as a shoe repair shop.

That his efforts in arranging his creditable office is appreciated by the Commissioners is evident by the fact that they agreed to reimburse him in the amount of \$9.90 which he spent of his own money to equip the office. He made good use of paint on the walls and floors and by repairing second-hand furniture now is better able to carry on his work. He reports that quite a few Negro farmers have visited the office for information and advice since it was opened.

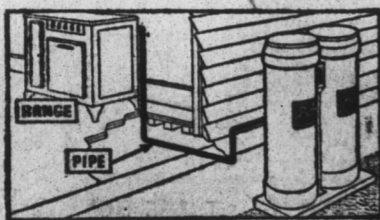

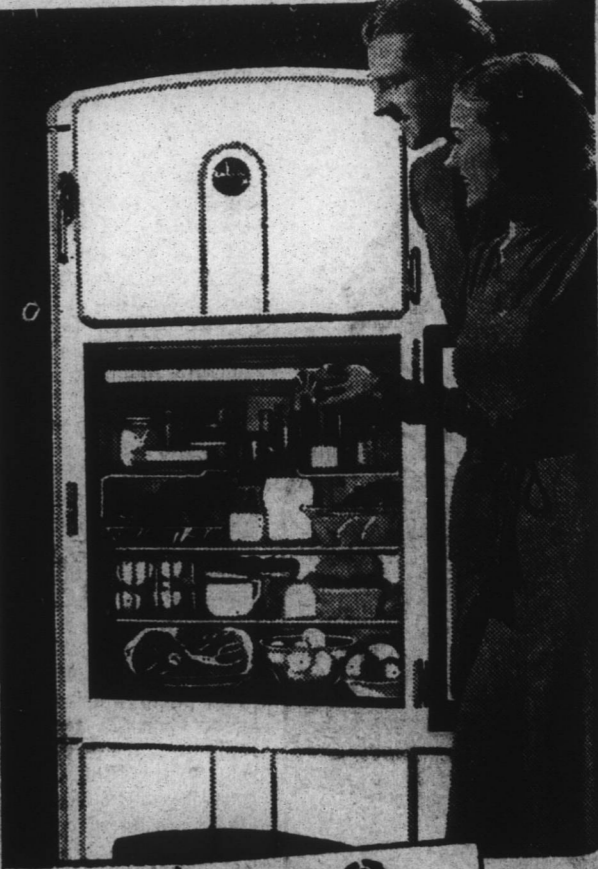
