In a proclamation issued today by Mayor J. H. McMullan, Saturday, May 27, was designated as Poppy Day in Edenton. The proclamation asked all citizens to observe the day by wearing a memorial poppy in honor of those who gave their lives in the World War, and to contribute for the welfare of the disabled veterans and dependent families of veterans. It stated:

"Whereas, when the forces of ruthless autocracy committed ag-gressions against the United States in 1917, the best young men of this nation offered their lives in the nation's defense, and

"Whereas, among these young men were many from Chowan County, who served gallantly and sacrificed greatly in the conflict, and

"Whereas, more than one hundred thousand young Americans were called upon to sacrifice their lives that America might be secure as the land of liberty, justice and democracy,

"Now, therefore, I, J. H. McMullan, Mayor of the City of Edenton, believing that the memory of their high patriotic sacrifice should be kept bright for the inspiration of America, urge all citizens to wear their memorial flower, the poppy, on Saturday, May 27, and give for the poppy as generously as they are able to aid the war's living victims, the disabled veterans and dependent families.

"To that purpose, I do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 27, to be Poppy Day in the City of Edenton."
