

New Roof On Court House Considered

Continual Repairs Does Not Suit County Commissioners

Receipt by the County Commissioners of a bid from Harry Sprull to repair the roof on the Court House revived the idea Monday of recovering the building with a composition roof similar to the one recently placed on the Capola House. Mr. Sprull informed the Commissioners that though water does not drop inside the building, there are several leaks in the roof, the water being absorbed by the shingles which, of course, will eventually rot and call for considerable repairs.

The Commissioners were of the opinion that continuous repair bills for the roof would soon call for almost as much expenditure as a new roof and therefore favored putting a new covering on instead of making necessary repairs at this time. To speed up action D. M. Warren, C. A. Boyce and R. D. Dixon were appointed a committee to investigate the matter and report at the next regular meeting as to the cost involved.
