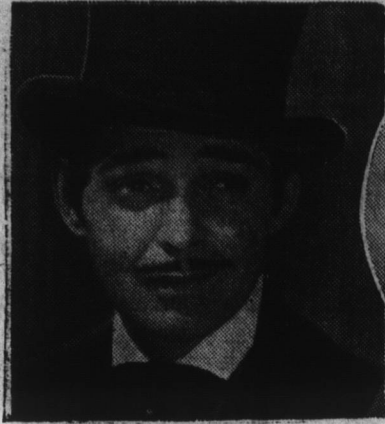

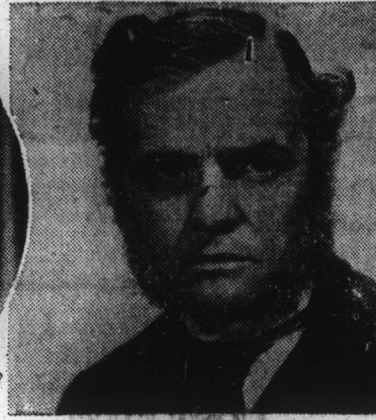

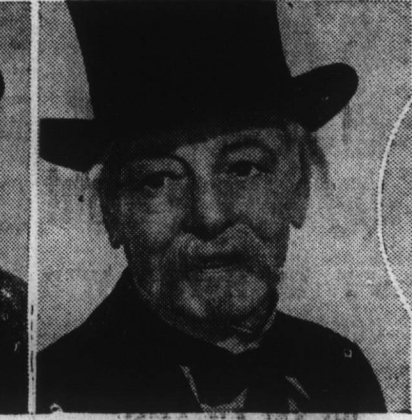

All Star Band Will Appear In Edenton Thursday, May 23

Key Members of Over Dozen Bands Make Up Group

EXPECT BIG CROWD

Movement Originated in Edenton Meeting Last Fall

The spring concert of the Eastern Carolina All Star High School Band, which is composed of key members selected from more than a dozen outstanding school bands, will make its first appearance in Edenton on Thursday, May 23rd. This event bids fair to be one of the State's most colorful and entertaining musical events of the year.

Plans now call for an all-day outing for the celebrated young school musicians who visit Edenton, and every effort is being expended on the part of the civic-minded citizens of this town to make the occasion a most worthwhile and long-remembered event.

The Eastern Carolina All Star High School Band movement originated among a group of school band

leaders who assembled in Edenton last fall with the idea in mind to create a greater degree of good will and civic appreciation of band music among the cities and towns of the eastern section of the State and it was decided that this group of 100 of the East's most outstanding band members would get together four times each year for the purpose of rendering an outstanding concert to music enthusiasts in the city where presented.

Various committees have been formed through the cooperation of C. L. McCullers, local band director, and all indications point to a most enjoyable occasion for the many thousands who will visit Edenton on that date.

The concert is being staged in Edenton's new Athletic Park at night under flood lights and ample seating space is provided for the thousands who are expected to be on hand to hear the program.

Previous appearances of the All Star Band have been held indoors at Ahsokie in the fall and at Washington during February, at which times a small admission charge was made to defray the expense of staging the concert. The people of Edenton have decided to dispense with the admission charge and the necessary funds are being provided by the various civic and municipal organizations of Edenton.

The program, which will follow a huge parade in the afternoon, led by 40 smiling drum majorettes, will consist of familiar band selections and marches by the best known composers and will last for approximately one hour.

The mayors and school principals

in the towns from which the band members come will be invited guests of Edenton and the All Star Band. A banquet will be provided by the Edenton Band parents to all band members and chaperones and mayors and school heads will be honor guests at the banquet which will be held in the Armory at 7 o'clock.

The Edenton High School Band is host to the All Star Band group and a most enjoyable occasion is anticipated by all who visit Edenton on May 23rd.
