Hertford, too, was visited and a group of representative business men headed by Mayor Vivian Darden also expressed no desire to enter into a controversy regarding changing of the route or designating an alternate route. Both Elizabeth City and Hertford agreed to send a delegation to Raleigh Wednesday to support Edenton, Windsor and Williamston delegations in their fight to prevent any change whatever to the present
