

Feast Of Lights At St. Paul's Sunday Impressive Affair

Members Wend Their Way Home With Lighted Tapers

Beautifully impressive was the Feast of Lights offered as part of the Epiphany service at St. Paul's last Sunday night, and a large congregation of Episcopalians and many from other churches took part in it to the pleasure of the rector, the Rev. C. A. Ashby, who inaugurated it as an annual innovation here. Those who participated carried lighted tapers from the church to their homes after the services, symbolizing the carrying of the Light of the World into their residences, and with very few exceptions this was executed.

On the church altar Sunday night thirteen candles were shown in illumination, the largest one behind the cross representing Christ, and the other twelve the apostles. As the services were about to conclude, the regular church lights were blacked out and the gathering room, except for the altar candles was in total darkness. The twelve church vestry men then walked to the altar with long tapers which were lighted from the Cross candle, and in turn they went about the congregation and lighted similar tapers given the attendants as they entered the church ahead of the service.

With lighted tapers the congregation departed for its homes, many by automobile but an equal number afoot. As they went their way in groups and singly, the waving tapers sparkling through the outer darkness made a particularly impressive sight.

TO CHOWAN COUNTY TAX PAYERS Avoid Penalty On Tax By Paying Your Taxes During January

According to action Monday, January 6, 1941, by the Chowan County Commissioners, a penalty will be placed on all 1940 taxes not paid by February 1, 1941.

Beginning February 1, 1941, a penalty of one per cent will be added; on March 1, 1941, another one per cent will be added, and after April 1, 1941, an additional one-half of one per cent will be added for each month until taxes are paid.

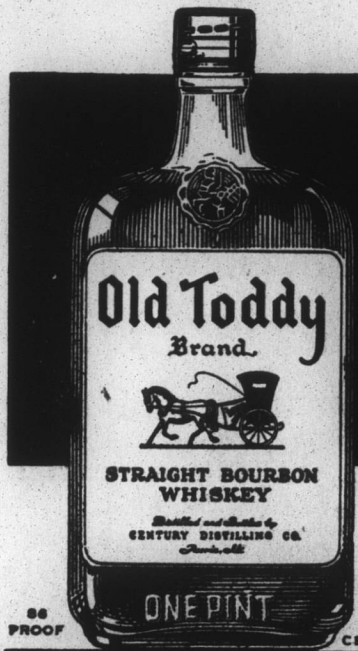
